

Headteacher's News

Last week we had an assessor from the **Historical Association** spend the whole day with us at St Mary's, looking at all aspects of the way that the children experience the subject during their time with us. It was really helpful to get an expert's perspective on the way that our curriculum studies the past and it was very pleasing that the visitor was very impressed with what he saw. We met at least the 'silver' criteria for everything and the 'gold' for lots of it too, so we know that we are very much on the right lines when it comes to engaging with and interpreting the past. We were able to show how our history curriculum engages with both the local community, including the many ways in which it has changed, as well as the wider national and global communities. A strength of our history curriculum, the visitor said, included the way in which children learn about the topic before then *applying* their learning, for example, studying the impact of the **Second World War** and **The Blitz** before then writing a diary extract imagining they are an evacuee. This type of approach provides opportunities for the children to be creative and in some cases to develop greater empathy (depending on who is the subject of the historical topic!). Groups of children of a variety of ages were able to talk very articulately to the visitor about what they had learnt in their history lessons, not just this year, but in years gone by. History topics like **Ancient Greece**, the **Stone Age** and the **Mayans** are fascinating and the children love immersing themselves in them; as a history graduate myself, it's great to see intriguing periods in history proving every bit as popular now as they have always been.

Our requests for a significant minority of parents to **not park on double-yellow lines** near to the school gates are still not being responded to and there continue to be cases of parents mounting the curb near Children walking past - a very dangerous practice which most of our parents disapprove of in the strongest terms. The **'School Streets'** initiative goes before the governors in the next few weeks after the overwhelmingly positive response to our parent consultation in the autumn term. If governors approve our School Streets involvement, then the next step will be for the Council to consult the local community before the extended trial, with some streets inaccessible at specific times of the day, starts later in the year.

Battery Bug's from Science Symposium

We would like to remind all parents that any kind of electrical device involving **batteries** and wires is something that needs to be treated with caution and respect and that parents should ensure that their children are supervised when they are in use. Small batteries, like the circular ones put into watches, are particularly dangerous should a child swallow them; something that happens more than you would imagine according to the NHS. Parents should be mindful that the **Battery Bugs** given out at the Science Symposium recently included two small rounded batteries and that if any children took home their Battery Bug they should be supervised when it is in use. Batteries, including the small round ones which were part of the bug, can be dangerous if they overheat and we have had one instance reported to us of this happening, so do please ensure that the 'Bugs' are used under supervision and that nothing is done to them by small fingers that might compromise the safety of the batteries.
