Headteacher's News

In the last couple of days our three Y3 classes have taken centre stage at our **Harvest Festival** celebration at St Mary's church, entertaining everyone with their drama- and music-enhanced performance, and reminding all in attendance of the key messages and values of this important event in the Christian calender. It was lovely to see so many parents in attendance, making the services real whole community events. Thank you very much to those that were able to donate some food of one kind or another – I am told that the collection (see picture on the right) is much bigger than we have collected in the past, and it serves as a very good visual



representation of how compassionate and caring our school community is. The recipients of the donations will be the *'Christian Kitchen'* who cook hot meals every night of the year in Walthamstow Market, and *Mill Grove Children's Home*.

On another topic, a couple of parents have recently spoken to me about **Pupil Premium** funding; this was very timely as we have just finished accounting for the 2017-18 funding we received to improve outcomes for pupils from families who qualify for the Pupil Premium. In total we receive a ring-fenced £100,000 each year to target resources at Pupil Premium children in order to support their academic and all-round development. Often this will take the form of very specific interventions, trips or events taking place to support the Pupil Premium pupils' progress, but just as often the funds will be used to create much broader, highly fertile conditions for learning at St Mary's so that there are clear and measurable benefits for the Pupil Premium pupils and very good *indirect* benefits for everyone else; an example of this would be the use of Pupil Premium funds to reduce class sizes when we stream pupils in the mornings – everyone benefits. We are required to demonstrate the impact of our very large Pupil Premium funding and can show the vast gap between Pupil Premium pupils' attainment at St Mary's compared to how Pupil Premium pupils typically attain nationally. Non-Pupil Premium pupils do excellently as well, for a number of reasons, including benefiting from the indirect effects of the school's Pupil Premium expenditure without which a number of school-wide resources or strategies might not be viable.

A pupil that receives Pupil Premium funding is a pupil whose family has been in receipt of Free School Meals at any point, however briefly, between Year Rec and 6. This method of identifying pupils who are economically disadvantaged is a rather clumsy one in some respects but it is probably better than alternative measurements that have sometimes been proposed. Because school meals are given freely in Year Rec, 1 and 2 at the moment, parents tend not to fill out the form to receive 'free' school meals until their child enters the juniors (where meals are no longer free), but I would urge any YRec, Y1 and Y2 parents who suspect they might qualify to complete the free school meals form because each child that is subsequently categorised as qualifying for Pupil Premium makes a big difference to the schools' finances. It may seem odd to complete a form requesting free school meals when they are free already in the infants, but that is the way the system works! A further letter will be issued to YRec-2 parents very soon with more explicit information about how you qualify and what you need to do to qualify – in a nutshell, if

only 6 or 7 infant parents from our 270 infant parents completed the form we would have in excess of £10,000 extra in the kitty.

Finally, on Friday last week while enjoying the unusually warm weather and cloudless sky, I conducted a quick survey of some Y1 and Y2 jumpers left on the bench while the children played in the Sports Park. Of the 25 or so jumpers (it was a warm day as I said!) that I perused, around 50% of them had both first-name *and* surname; about 30% had a first-name only; and about 20% had no name at all. Of all the jumpers, only about 3 out of the 25 had a class name written on them. What I would like to do is get some of our ever-eager-to-do-jobs-Year 6s to regularly return lost property to classes as we know how very frustrating it is for parents when expensive uniform items regularly go astray. In order for this to be done it is going to be necessary for the child's *whole name* to be written (as some first-names are very popular) and the *class name* to be written too – if this is done routinely, then redistributing the lost property will be a quick and easy job for our Y6 monitors. Lots of children have very nice labels sewn in their clothing, but where these labels are used, please also write in the class name – it might not enhance the look but it will help us if it goes missing! Thank you for your help with all of this.

Parent Consultation Meetings

This message was sent separately to parents earlier today, but in case any parents missed it...

There was an error in dates with the Parent Consultation evenings in the last newsletter. They will take place on Wednesday 7th from 3.40pm to 6pm and again on Thursday 8th November from 3.40pm to 7pm. We are trialling a new method of booking your appointment. Please log on to your Parentmail account and select "Events". You will see the two evenings listed – find the name of your child's class teacher and select your slot. If you have more than one child at the school, both teachers should be listed and you can choose an appointment for each teacher. Bear in mind that it is probably best not to book two consecutive appointments if that is the case – e.g. not 3.40 and 3.50 – 3.40 and 4pm would be better to allow for any slight over-run, and for you to move from one teacher to the other. Once a slot is allocated, it is no longer visible as "available". If, for any reason, you cannot book on line, please do come to the school office. Slots will be available to book from 9am this morning.

Year 6 Trip

On Monday, a few of the Y6 children visited Oxford University; a trip they thoroughly enjoyed. Throughout the day, they generated their own 'big questions' and used those questions as a focus for a group debate. The children enjoyed a tour around the different college grounds; learned about the history of the university; got to visit one of the university libraries and were given the opportunity to explore the architecture of the awe-inspiring buildings. Oxford University certainly raised the children's horizons and encouraged them to aspire to achieve great things in the future, so that maybe they too could one day attend the famous institution.

Class Corner – Y4-Attlee

In Year 4-Attlee we have been doing amazing work in the afternoons. We have been working hard as geographers, scientists, theologians and swimmers.

In Topic, we looked at the British coastline to identify key features and how these were formed. The key concept we have been learning about has been 'erosion', which is the process by which coastal features are formed via the impact of the weather – the picture on the right illustrates this.



During our science lessons, we have been investigating sound. We had a really fun experiment measuring the loudness of different musical instruments (in decibels) and making our own musical shakers using different materials in Pringle tubes.

The story of Creation has been our focus for R.E. this half-term. We have had fantastic discussions on Friday afternoons and I am really impressed with the respect 4-Attlee have for others with different beliefs and opinions.

Lastly, every single child in 4 Attlee has made exponential progress with their swimming. We went every day for the first two weeks of term and had an amazing time, got fitter and improved what is a highly valuable life skill.
