Ken Hoy memorial bench

At the end of July, invited guests joined the Friends for the unveiling of a memorial bench dedicated to Ken Hoy, Suntrap's founder and first Headteacher. Guests included Councillor Peter Herrington, LBWF, Councillor David Stallan, Chairman of Epping Forest District Council, Caroline Haines who sits on the Epping Forest and Commons Committee, City of London as well as many past Suntrap staff, friends, teachers and members of Ken's family. Kerry Rolison, Suntrap's current Head made a short speech in which she spoke about Ken's pivotal and inspirational role in founding Suntrap. She commended LBWF for its continuing support for the Centre at a time when many others around the country have been closed. She thanked Suntrap staff past and present for the many years of hard work teaching children in and about the forest. Kerry then reminded everyone that as each



We have also acquired a new reptile to add to our collection - a Russian tortoise. Staff




worked hard to make her a lovely new enclosure ready for the new school year.

With the range of animals we have, children can also learn about the different characteristics of each animal group, as well as animal adaptation and food chains. A review of summer

Nineteen classes camped at Suntrap during summer term (and five have done do so in September). The camping groups undertake a great variety of activities including pond dipping, orienteering, natural art, team challenges, bushcraft and many more. Summer is also a very busy time for day visits too with staff teaching everything from Bear Hunt to A' level ecology.



Then during the summer holidays 285 free places were offered on bushcraft and animal academy courses for teenagers from Waltham Forest thanks to the borough's free holiday activity programme. The programme also provided 13 family animal outreach sessions at schools throughout the borough.

Be Wild Forest Saturday Club

The Be Wild Club continues to meet every second Saturday of the month from 10-1pm for children aged 5-11 (under eights must be accompanied by a parent/carer).

In June the club had fun finding out about plants in the forest and then making some elder bracelets, pounded plants to make plant prints on bandanas and made plant bookmarks.

July was campfire cooking – including pancakes.

In August the group took nets out into the meadows in the forest to find out which insects live amongst the grasses and wild flowers.

Then in September they learnt how to tie knots to make a simple bivouac camp with tarpaulins, before picking apples to make a tasty stewed apple snack on small camp stoves.



Bat and moth night



On 15th September we ran our first ever bat and moth night. Lots of families came with torches to join volunteers and staff on a walk with bat detectors around the camping field pond, before heading to the lights in the camping shelter which were attracting the moths.

There was great excitement every time the detectors picked up a bat, even though they



were difficult to see in the dark. The moths however were much easier to spot, as they were drawn to the lights. The bat detectors picked up the frequencies for pipistrelles and Daubenton's. Moths seen included, square-spot rustic, brimstone, common wainscot and snout. Thanks to Martin McCleary who brought all the equipment for the moth trapping and for his great expertise which he so happily shared with the families.
