Head Teacher's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

As we reach December, I realise that Christmas may be very different this year but our preparations for a festive end of term are well underway, as we ensure that our children experience a wonderful Christmas in school. Next week, children will be making their own Christingles and taking part in a St Mary's Christingle service. A Christingle is a symbolic object used in the Advent. Christingle, from a word of German origin, Christkindl, meaning 'Little Christ Child', is used to celebrate Jesus Christ as the "Light of the World". We will also be practising Christmas carols and participating in a St Mary's carol service.

From Monday 7th December, our post boxes will be placed at each entrance so that the children can post their Christmas wishes to their friends. We kindly ask that all Christmas cards are posted before Friday 11th December. Please also include the recipients year group on the envelope. The cards will be then be kept for a minimum of 72 hours before being safely distributed the following week.

Learning Council


The Learning Council all fed back positively with regards to the learning going on in classes. Year 4 have described learning as "focused" and Year 5 have been happy with "learning new things but revisiting previous learning too ". All year groups are enjoying their core texts, with specific mentions of the Hobbit in year 6 and Iron Man in year 3. Like the School Council, the Learning Council wanted to see more Christmas-based learning taking place in the festive period. Y4 Class Corner

In Year 4, we have been enjoying our learning this half

term. Our Science topic throughout the whole Autumn Term has been materials however this term we have been looking at how certain materials change. We have carried out a number of practical experiments; such as, testing the viscosity of certain liquids; seeing how the temperature of a material will affect the speed the item will melt/dissolve; investigating different solvents and how soluble they are; and even thinking about the best place to dry our wet socks! Each of these experiments have allowed us to explore different skills from planning our own experiment, making predictions, carrying out investigations as well as recording results and making conclusions. We are fully fledged scientists now!

COVID-19: Our Joint Responsibilities

One important part of ensuring the safety and wellbeing of pupils, students, parents and our community is testing for coronavirus. We all have a duty to make sure that the right people have access to a test at the right time.

- You should only book a test if your child has any of these three coronavirus symptoms:
- 1. a high temperature: any new high temperature where your child feels hot to touch on their chest or back (you do not need to measure the temperature)
- 2. a new continuous cough: coughing a lot for more than an hour, or three or more coughing episodes in 24 hours
- 3. a loss of, or change in, sense of smell or taste: a noticeable loss of smell or taste or things smell and taste different to normal
- Your child does not need a test if they have a runny nose, are sneezing or feeling unwell but do not have a temperature, cough or loss of, or change in, sense of smell or taste because these are not normally symptoms of coronavirus.
- If you are unsure about whether to get a test, please check the official list of symptoms on the NHS website, which is reviewed regularly: www.nhs.uk/conditions/coronavirus-covid-19/symptoms/
- Only the person with symptoms should get a test. You do not need to get a test for anyone else in the household unless they also have any of the three symptoms listed above. All members of the household need to self-isolate whilst waiting for the test result.
- If the person with symptoms' test comes back positive, other members of their household should continue self-isolating for 14 days and only get a test if they develop coronavirus symptoms.
