Dear Parents and Carers,

How wonderful it was to welcome everyone back from the holiday, and begin yet another exciting half-term at Saint Mary's. Rested and recharged, the children have begun the half-term with their customary enthusiasm and determination to be the best they can be.

The cheese and wine evening, held last week, was a terrific success and it was wonderful to see so many of you at the event. Led by Ms Ford, parents were taken on a tour of Saint Mary's during which they were able to see the learning environments and displays which make Saint Mary's such a distinctive, special and unique school. Staff at Saint Mary's take great pride in the learning environments, so it is always a great pleasure to share them with parents and carers alike.

This week the children have been learning about British black history. From year one to year six, children learned about the enormous contributions made to our country and society by black Britons. In key stage two, year three learned about the Ivory Bangle Lady and Roman York, while year four learned about racism in football and efforts to banish it from the game. In upper key stage two, year five focused on the British Empire and the impact it had on black Victorians, while year six learned about the Bristol Bus Boycott: its cause, its impact and its legacy.

Forgiveness

Luke 15: 11-24

The parable of the lost son

This week our school value is forgiveness. Our school vision is: "I am the vine and you are the branches. If you remain with me and I with you then you will bear much fruit. Love one another as I have loved you." John 15. We have been thinking about 'bearing much fruit' as being productive and having a positive impact. Holding on to a grudge, rather than forgiving, can stand in the way of this productivity and impact, because it can preoccupy our thoughts and make us feel sad, resentful or angry. If we are able to forgive those who have wronged us, we let go of these negative feelings and have more space in our hearts and minds for the work God wants us to be doing.

In one of our favourite school songs, 'Blinded by your Grace,' Stormzy talks about being forgiven by God and feeling that he has a second chance at life:

Lord I've been broken
Although I'm not worthy
You fixed me
Now I'm Blinded By Your Grace
You came and saved me

We also thought about the story of the Lost son. In this well-known parable, a son who has returned to his father's house after a period of absence and rebellion, is feted with a big celebration. "My son was dead, but now he is alive again! He was lost, but now he is found!' His brothers are resentful at how quickly he is forgiven and at the celebration, but Jesus teaches his followers that God is so thrilled every time someone returns to Him from a period of being 'lost', he celebrates us in this way.

Forgiveness is often hard, but it brings peace to us, as well as to the person who has done wrong and repented. Jesus teaches that, through his sacrifice, we can all forgive and be forgiven, as it says in the Lord's Prayer. The children have reflected this week on how they could forgive and make up with someone, or say sorry themselves for anything they may have done to hurt others.

This week we also mark Remembrance Day, with a minute's silence at 11am on Friday. We reflect on the efforts of world leaders to reconcile and work towards peace.



Healthy Snacks



We would like to remind parents and carers that St Mary's is a Healthy School. Children should not bring chocolate bars, crisps or fizzy drinks as morning snacks, if your child does bring these in, they will be replaced with a piece of fruit and sent home with them at the end of the school day. Please ensure that should you like to provide your child with a snack that it is a healthy option. Nut free cereal bars, yoghurt bars or fruit bars are recommended.

All children are encouraged to drink water regularly – please ensure that your child is bringing in their own water bottles, these can be refilled during the school day.

Flu Vaccinations

Children who have the flu vaccine are less likely to pass the virus on to friends and family, especially those who may be at greater risk from flu, such as young babies, elderly people or friends and relatives with a serious health condition.

EYFS - Caring
