Dear Parents and Carers,

To begin this newsletter, I wanted to thank you all for your part in making World Book Day such a wonderful day at St. Mary's. There was a real buzz of excitement around the school as the children spoke about their favourite books and heard from their teachers about their favourite books, too. From Harry Potter to the Grufallo; from Little Red Riding Hood to Cinderella, the creativity, imagination and ingenuity that was on display in the costumes was fantastic. It was heartening to see our children embrace their favourite characters and books with such eagerness.

I want to share with you some exciting news about our work to support refugees. We are in the process of applying to become a School of Sanctuary. There are over 370 Schools of Sanctuary in the UK at present – from nurseries, to primary schools; secondary schools to sixth form colleges. Schools within this growing network, aim to raise awareness about forced displacement and migration and to support newly arrived children and all people seeking sanctuary. Schools of Sanctuary are enormously important as they ensure that provision effectively supports and meets the needs of children who have often experienced great challenges. As part of our effort to become a School of Sanctuary we have of course already done a huge amount: we have held two cultural festivals, taught a unique series of lessons, worked to support refugees within our community and, through our work, helped a family resettle in the U.K. This important work is of course an outgrowing of our school vision – "Love one another as I have loved you" - and a wonderful example of our commitment to transform others, ourselves and our community.

It was a great pleasure to see so many of you at the recent quiz night organised by the newly founded Parent Friend Association (PFA). The event was a huge success and I am looking forward to future events organised by the PFA. There are a few photographs from the event later in the newsletter.

Next week will see the return of the Science Fair to St. Mary's. Spread over two days this year, the event promises to be an inspiring showcase of the amazing talents of our children. The range of experiments on show last year was incredible and I am sure the fair this year will only build on the success of last year's fair. I know that our budding scientists are hugely excited for the event and having heard from some of them about their projects, they have every reason to be. I hope to see you all at the fair.

Finally, Ms Valiquette had the pleasure of presenting a number of children with Young Transformers awards in assembly today. If your child has transformed themselves, others or their community, please do encourage them to apply for the award.

I would like to end this edition of the newsletter with a quote from Romans chapter 12 verse 2: "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is—his good, pleasing and perfect will."

Please ensure this message includes the reason your child is off sick - i.e. sore throat, temperature or stomach bug.


If you need to collect your child for a medical appointment during the day or they are late to school due to a medical appointment, you will need to provide the school office with an appointment letter/record.

The Friends of St Mary's School are now hard at work planning a summer fair - Do keep your eyes peeled for details.



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
