We presented the first of our Young Transformers awards at the start of the term. Rafe and Doug in Y4 won a Young Transformers award for the work they have done to transform their community. When the boys decided that they wanted to establish a sports club for their friends, they did not wait for a club to materialize: they acted. Together, they organised a club for their friends to join and play football. For setting up this club, for transforming others and their community, the boys won the first of many Young Transformers awards. Well done, Rafe and Doug!

Finally, Ms Ford spent half-term visiting a school in Kenya. This was part of a project in collaboration with the Diocese of Chelmsford. You can read more about this trip in the newsletter. We would like to foster links with a school in Kenya and I hope to be able to update you on this soon.

<u>Miss Ford visit</u>

Some of you with long memories may remember that I was meant to travel to visit a primary school in Embu (Kenya). This was supposed to happen in March 2020 but certain world events put a stop to the trip!

However, in the October half term, I visited Kenya along with 11 other school teachers and leaders from schools in the Chelmsford diocese. St Mary's is coupled with Lower Sagana primary - a school with 1300 pupils from between the ages of 3 and 14. I spent 4 days at Lower Sagana Primary School, observing lessons and hearing about their plans for the future. I was also lucky enough to learn how the children (and their teachers) grow food in the school both to eat and supplement the school's income. Although they are on their 'summer holiday' at the moment, when they return to school, we hope that the children of Lower Sagana can teach our children a little bit more about the agriculture which is a staple of daily life in Embu. We also visited St Monica's Special School and St. Stephen's Children's Home - both of which were experiences I will never forget. In the future, St Mary's would like to build links with all three schools and explore how we can learn from each other and develop in the future.

<u>Worship</u>

This week we are focusing on equality. There are many passages in the Bible which remind us that God would want everyone to be treated equally.

We focused on the Luke: The good Samaritan

25 On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he asked, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?"

26 "What is written in the Law?" he replied. "How do you read it?"

27 He answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'[c]; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'[d]"

28 "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live."

29 But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?"

30 In reply Jesus said: "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. They stripped him of his clothes, beat him and went away, leaving him half dead. 31 A priest happened to be going down the same road, and when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. 32 So too, a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. 33 But a Samaritan, as he traveled, came where the man was; and when he saw him, he took pity on him. 34 He went to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring on oil and wine. Then he put the man on his own donkey, brought him to an inn and took care of him. 35 The next day he took out two denarii[e] and gave them to the innkeeper. 'Look after him,' he said, 'and when I return, I will reimburse you for any extra expense you may have.'

36 "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?"

37 The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."

During our collective worship, we discussed how we should treat people equally. We then celebrated all our differences but realised we all have similarities. One similarity we all have is that we are part of St Mary's School. We discussed how our courageous advocacy projects are helping many in our community.
